Just Who's Teaching our Chapters in Our Way Home Anyway?

Here are some brief biographical sketches of our members who are teaching the nine chapters in *Our Way Home* authored by the Rev. Dr. Daniel E. Paavola. *There's a bio for him, too!*

Alan Shaw, RLC Vicar, Teacher of Chapters 1 and 9. Alan moved to Holly Springs before retiring from the Army in September 2014. He pursued certifications in personal, congregational and high performance pattern coaching and started a coaching business in 2014. He also works at Fort Bragg with the Special Operations community. He is a current member of the RLC Council and serves as a Worship Leader at the 10:45 service. He was accepted into Concordia University's Specific Ministry Pastor (SMP) Program for the January 2019 cohort, so he's now considered our VICAR! Yeah! His ministry will focus on congregational coaching and leadership development for pastors, staff, and church members. He and his wife, Faith, have two children.

Tim Striplin, Teacher of Chapter 2. Tim and his family have attended RLC for almost 10 years. He is active in the music ministry, singing in Cantus Christe—and in choir or playing the piano, whenever Bob Unger can "rope him into participating." Tim currently serves as the Liturgist for the 10:30 service on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month. He has previously taught adult Sunday School classes on the liturgy and assisted his wife in the Parents & Twos class. Tim is a marketing technologist by day, but his passion is the history and development of Christian worship. He holds a PhD in Historical Musicology from UNC Chapel Hill, specializing in the musical, theological, and political aspects of transmission in early medieval Gregorian chant, especially the Alleluia chant before the Gospel lesson. Tim taught piano in the Cary/Apex area for over 15 years, and has passed on his love of music to his children, Annalisa (ballet and piano), Marta (Scottish Highland dance and oboe), and Sebastian (undecided, but probably trumpet). Kathy Rihani, Teacher of Chapter 3. She graduated from UNCG in 1969 with a degree in marketing. She married Fuad Rihani in 1969 and then had 3 children. In his previous Calls, he held positions of Director of Worship and Music, Organist, Director of Christian Education, Principal, Teacher, AD and Coach at Faith LC, Appleton, WI; Immanuel Lutheran Church/School, Danville, IL; Immanuel Lutheran Church/School, Des Plaines, IL; St. John Lutheran Church/ School, Hannibal, MO. He has also served as summer staff at Camp Arcadia in MI. He holds a BA and Master of Church Music (composition) degrees from Concordia University, Chicago, IL. Bob is married to MaryAnn (Co-Director of Children and Family Ministry) at RLC. They and have 11 children and 11 grandchildren.

John Heilman, Teacher of Chapter 5. John and his wife, Virginia, moved to Cary in mid-2017 and joined RLC later that year. He retired in 1999 after a career in Human Resources management. They moved to Cary to be closer to family who are in the area. He and Virginia serve at RLC as counters, greeters and ushers, and helpers with the third and fifth grade classes at RLS. They also make gift bags for visitors. They attend all 3 services. John and Virginia lead a neighborhood Bible study on *The Truth Project*. He has taught, co-taught, and served as a substitute teacher in both adult and children's Sunday School and a co-leader for Wednesday Night Workshops for approximately the last 10 years. He has co-led *The Story* and *The Truth Project*. He is an engineer at IBM. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from Purdue University. Tim is married to Sue. They have one son, Daniel.

Melinda Stephani (Mindy), Teacher of Chapter 7 is in her 10th year as a member of RLC along with husband, Marty.
